Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

As we enter the Lenten season, I invite you to commit to some regular quiet time for self-reflection and wide-eyed contemplation of the world around us and to participate in one or more Lenten disciplines. Worship is, of course, one of these disciplines. Our Lenten theme is “Looking Beyond the Blinders.” Our Scripture readings will take us to texts that I might refer to as “The Best of Luke,” or perhaps the best-known stories in Luke. We will look each week to see these well-known stories in new ways that show us how to look beyond whatever blinders we might be accustomed to. (We all wear blinders of some sort—blinders that make it easier for us not to see certain realities.)

One of the things that influenced the Worship and Music Committee (WAM) members as we discussed our theme was an article we read called “A Lent Where #BlackLivesMatter: 10 Ideas for Black History Month and the White Church” by David Roberts (<https://www.patheos.com/blogs/davidhenson/2015/02/a-lent-where-blacklivesmatter-black-history-month-and-the-white-church/>). WAM members liked the idea of looking not only inward, but outward toward societal shortcomings during Lent. Certainly, we need to remember issues of systemic racism against all people of color in our Lenten reflections. Our society faces serious problems with poverty, addiction, mental illness and many other issues as well. To this end, WAM is hosting three virtual discussions with guest speakers who will talk about some of these issues and who will invite questions and discussion. The schedule of these discussions, which will take place at our normal Zoom link at 3:00 p.m., is:

February 28 – Focus on indigenous peoples with speaker Nelson Capitan from the Laguna Pueblo;

March 7 – Focus on reaching out to immigrants with speaker Guillermo Yela from Camino de Vida Church;

March 28 – Focus on poverty and local needs with speaker George Lyon, Director of Samaritan House.

I also encourage you to add to your Lenten discipline some of the disciplines in the article referenced above. Check out the article (link above) and broaden the ideas suggested to think about how you might take off your blinders regarding some of the many issues facing our country and our world today. Follow social media blogs by people of color during this season; watch films that speak to issues of racism. The article suggests pairing films to see white and black history juxtaposed (e.g., *Gone With the Wind* and *12 Years a Slave*; *Mississippi Burning* and *Selma*). Look for the documentary *Witness at Tornillo* about separation of migrant families. A little online research will offer you lots of options for blogs, books, and films.

This Sunday, the first Sunday in Lent, **we will celebrate the Lord's Supper**, so please have a bite of something to eat and something to drink with you when you Zoom in for worship. Remember, just as common foods for Jesus were bread and wine, foods common to your kitchen will be spirit-filled as we come to the table together. Juice and bread, tortilla and coffee, fruit and tea...God's presence will be with you whatever you bring to the table.

He said, “That you love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and muscle and intelligence—and that you love your neighbor as well as you do yourself.”

“Good answer!” said Jesus. “Do it and you’ll live.”

Looking for a loophole, he asked, “And just how would you define ‘neighbor’?”

Jesus answered by telling a story. “There was once a man traveling from Jerusalem to Jericho. On the way he was attacked by robbers. They took his clothes, beat him up, and went off leaving him half-dead. Luckily, a priest was on his way down the same road, but when he saw him he angled across to the other side. Then a Levite religious man showed up; he also avoided the injured man.

“A Samaritan traveling the road came on him. When he saw the man’s condition, his heart went out to him. He gave him first aid, disinfecting and bandaging his wounds. Then he lifted him onto his donkey, led him to an inn, and made him comfortable. In the morning he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, ‘Take good care of him. If it costs any more, put it on my bill—I’ll pay you on my way back.’

“What do you think? Which of the three became a neighbor to the man attacked by robbers?”

“The one who treated him kindly,” the religion scholar responded. Jesus said, “Go and do the same.”
