Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

Given our Lenten theme of "Looking Beyond the Blinders," I've been thinking a lot about seeing what is outside the narrow vision I sometimes have out of habit. So often in the day-to-day, I see things in terms of my to-do list and the habits I establish for my days: time for work, for meals, for recreation. I suspect that I am not alone in falling into this tunnel vision, where invisible blinders prevent me from taking time to really see what's going on around me.

I am reminded of a few lines about seeing in Annie Dillard's wonderful book *Pilgrim at Tinker Creek*, which I've probably shared with you before. Early in the book she writes, "...[B]eauty and grace are performed whether or not we will or sense them. The least we can do is try to be there." Later she says, "This is our life, these are our lighted seasons, and then we die. . . . In the meantime, in between time, we can see." And again, in the last pages, she asserts, "The universe was not made in jest but in solemn, incomprehensible earnest. By a power that is unfathomably secret, and holy, and fleet. There is nothing to be done about it, but ignore it, or see."

Dillard explores the natural world of beauty and grace, but also assures us that in nature we find a kind of natural poverty, violence, and an order of predator and prey. How do we **see**, not only in nature but in our social and political structures, where things bring life and where they bring pain?

On Sunday, we will read from Luke 13 the parable of the fig tree and hear Jesus' lament over Jerusalem, whose people he has wanted to nurture and protect. But, he says, they were unwilling to accept prophets and teachers and even Jesus himself. And yet, as we read last week, Jesus sets his face on Jerusalem, determined to go there, knowing the city's unwillingness to accept him, reading the climate in which he was a storm that the authorities wanted to calm. How do we take our blinders off in order to see Jesus' offer of the nurture that will help us bear fruit?

I look forward to seeing you at our Zoom worship and again Sunday at 3:00 p.m. for our first Lenten lecture/discussion series with guest speaker Nelson Capitan.
