Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

This week we move almost to the end of the Book of Job—almost, but not quite; we'll be with Job for yet another week. In my mind, these final few chapters are rich with questions and majestic images and Job's growing understanding. God continues to raise questions for Job about the uncontrollable parts of nature; these questions also raise images of majesty and, to some extent, chaos. Job begins to understand how little he understands—always, I think, the path of wisdom. I hope you'll join us for worship as we explore Job's continued learning.

This book always reminds me, along with the reminder that God's creation is so incredibly beautiful, that creation also *seems* incredibly haphazard. One of my favorite books of all time, Annie Dillard's *Pilgrim at Tinker Creek*, marvels at the odd twists and turns that nature takes as she writes with an eye to understand something about the Creator. I quoted briefly from this book last week in my sermon, and am likely to again; in my mind it aligns so closely with some of what Job learns from his encounter with God. Today, I include here a poem by Lisa Bellamy about the wondrous journey of a pansy seed. Nature works in intricate and amazing ways, indeed.

On another note, **please remember to email me or call/email Linda in the office** if you would like to be included in our small group gatherings that we hope to get underway soon. Many of you said on your survey responses that you'd like an opportunity to meet together, but so far I've only heard from a couple of you about wanting to join one of these gatherings. The gatherings will give us an opportunity to visit face-to-face (or mask-to-mask) and will follow COVID restrictions—they'll be groups of five meeting on porches or patios, and socially distanced/masked.
