Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

I write this letter to you as I prepare for a week that will be focused mostly on worship planning for the coming months. That means I will have the privilege this week of reading through Scriptural texts suggested by different lectionaries and of imagining those texts' messages for us in our time.

It is always both a pleasure and a challenge to be immersed in Biblical texts for hours at a time and to discern which texts best speak to me and which, I hope, will allow me to convey messages and ask questions that will be meaningful for us all. Thank you to Pat Halverson, for filling the virtual pulpit on Sunday so that I can spend this week focused on worship planning. I ask that you hold my time of discernment in your prayers.

If you are like me, the national news continues to weigh heavily in your lives: division, violence, racism, pandemic, the destruction of fire and storm. Hold the world and especially our country in your prayers. Use your voice to speak in love for justice and for a way forward.

Lutheran minister, public theologian and author Nadia Bolz-Weber has been posting a Sunday prayer on social media each week. Below, you'll find an adaptation of her prayer from last Sunday. (I've removed her parenthetical comments and bits of more colorful language; you can see the entire prayer on Nadia's Facebook page.) I can relate to her sense of fatigue and fear during this time. Let us look to that place within us, the place where we find the divine—the place that American theologian and mystic Thomas Merton called "a point of nothingness," that Buddhists refer to as emptiness, that Bolz-Weber calls soul—to shelter ourselves when we are overwhelmed and disheartened. Let us see and perform acts of love and kindness.

from Nadia Bolz-Weber's Sunday Prayer for August 30, 2020:

God of many names,

We don't know how to feel less tired. We don't know how to vanguish our own fears. We don't know how to stop being angry at stupid people on [social media].... We don't know how to live through a global pandemic and anti-black violence and wildfires and hurricanes and the fact that Chadwick Boseman just died. ... We don't know how to sustain the effort it takes to not completely freak out, and the effort it takes to keep from freaking out is one of the things that is making us so tired. So we need some reminders right now, Lord. Remind us that for every tragedy that's "newsworthy" there are a million kindnesses, and countless acts of love that go unreported.... But more than anything, remind us of our own souls. Remind us that there is an essential, holy, unhurtable part of ourselves that never tires, that does not know fear, that is unaffected by other people, that cannot be irritated, that has nothing to achieve. If taking a few deep breaths reminds us of our truest center, then nudge us to breathe. . . . If laughing ... reminds us of what is most true, then nudge our friends to send funny texts. If eating a ... vegetable now and then reminds us that our bodies need us, then give us the will to make a salad.
