Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

If you participated in worship on March 7, you were an important part of FUPC's efforts to brainstorm ideas for our proposal to the Lilly Endowment for a National Clergy Renewal Program grant. This grant would provide monies to fund travel, lodging, and other expenses for a time of sabbatical for me in 2022 and, just as importantly, it would also secure monies to fund a renewal program for our congregation. Following indications of broad congregational support for us to pursue this grant opportunity, a Renewal Grant Task Force came together to work on the specifics of our proposal; members of that Task Force are relying heavily on your input to make decisions about the kinds of renewal activities that might allow our church family to track our spiritual journeys, to experience our interests in new ways, to become even closer as a faith community, and to refresh our energy so we can better look to the future. I am grateful to the Task Force members who have already done so much toward this opportunity for renewal. They are Pam Abreu, D.R. Palmer, Renee Soderlund, and Denice Spicer.

I thought you might like to hear the results of the March 7 breakout room discussions. Each group was asked to answer three questions: What activities make your heart sing? What is your favorite part of worship or what would you like to be included in worship that isn't? What word best describes your journey with God?

As might be expected, our spiritual journeys take on many different flavors, but many people mentioned growth, possibility, and challenge; many others spoke of God's presence and comfort; some talked about a commitment to service; some spoke about waves and mountains and valleys. These responses tell me that we are in a good place to enter into a process of renewal. We seek spiritual growth and challenge and have those among us who will remind us of God's comforting presence.

Your responses to questions about worship and activities that make our hearts sing are guiding us as we think about what worship might look like during a time of renewal and what events might best offer us a chance to track our interests in new directions. Music was a clear favorite for many of us in response to both questions—within the context of worship and within the context of our personal passions. Other heart-song activities included all manner of nature experiences, arts/crafts, and social gatherings. In addition to music, top responses for worship indicated a desire for close community/connections in a variety of ways, and more movement during worship.

We started generating ideas about renewal knowing we wanted to immerse ourselves in "Exploring the Word," both in terms of the capital "W" Word—Christ and Scripture—and the lower case "w" word—our own words, how we express and live out who God intends us to be. After listening to input from the congregation, from the Session's recent online retreat, and the Task Force's discussion around all the ideas we heard, we have revised our theme from "Exploring the Word" to "Tracking the Word," realizing that God is already in our midst; how do we track God's presence in our lives and what tracks do we leave as we live out our identity as Christ-followers?

If you have input toward our grant proposal process, please feel free to email me or other Task Force members. The proposal is due April 21; stay tuned for updates between now and then!

WORSHIP TIDBITS

Easter Sunday is upon us! Soon we will find ourselves shouting "Christ is risen!" We will celebrate the new life we find in Christ and offer joyful thanks for the sacrifice Jesus made for us on the cross.

But not all of us will understand that sacrifice in the same way.

The dominant theology of the cross in many Christian churches is one of atonement—that Jesus had to die to atone for our sins. But even within this theology, there are several different understandings. Jesus' death was a ransom to Satan, for instance, to buy the salvation of humankind; Jesus took on the sins of the world and carried them to the cross because only someone both human and divine could make that sacrifice; Jesus was a scapegoat—the innocent victim of a violent crowd who couldn't recognize who he was. There are several theories of how atonement works within this theology, and there are other beliefs, too, about how Jesus ended up, crucified on a cross, and how his crucifixion saves us.

This Easter season, I'd encourage you to think about your relationship with the saving Christ. How do you understand Christ's saving grace? How does that understanding align with what you think about the power and character of God?

Perhaps you'll want to suggest that we get together to talk about our varying understandings, questions, and confusion about the mystery of the cross. I would love to have that discussion with you!

CLERK'S CORNER

My Clerk's Corner this month is a small world, large church story. Some years ago, a group of friends of Patrick's and mine, who have traveled together, met in Louisville, Ky., to spend time seeing the sights and having fun. In preparation for the trip, I contacted John Detterick to see if our group could tour the PCUSA Head-quarters there. John enthusiastically responded yes and set up a tour for our group with a woman named Emily Odom. We had a wonderful tour.

Fast forward to 2020. You'll remember that last year the M&P Committee decided to have our PCUSA Giving Catalog event, when FUPC fundraises for a Village Well, in July instead of December when we participate in the PCUSA Christmas Joy Offering. We called it Christmas in July and the congregation responded by donating \$1890, enough for 1.26 Village Wells! The Christmas in July motif, or the amount raised, or both caught the attention of a PCUSA Mission Agency Staff member Teresa Mader, who asked for the story.

As the chair of M&P, I wrote it up emphasizing that our keen awareness of the importance of clean and secure water sources in Northern New Mexico, made it a joy for us to do this Christmas in July project. The next thing I knew, Katie and I received a request for a telephone interview with a person named Emily Odom. The name rang a bell, but I didn't know why.

Well, Katie and I spent more than an hour and a half telling Emily, now an ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament and a PCUSA News Agency Writer, our story. Emily had been caught by FUPC's story of providing water to villages with no wells, because of our own New Mexico challenges with water, and wanted to use it for a PCUSA World Water Day (March 22) release. Once on the zoom call, Emily said I looked familiar and remembered the tour she had given me and our group so many years ago. The confluence of a chance meeting in Louisville, FUPC's Village Well giving project, Emily's writer's instincts and World Water Day, 2021, leave me believing even more strongly than I always have that God is, indeed, in his heaven!

Your TT&T committee includes a dedicated group of individuals that keep track of our finances and plan how to put to good use all the talents and generous donation of time our church family contributes. We are also thinking about the long-term financial stability of our church and take care of other duties that crop up; long time members Richard Lindeborg and Van Swan keep me on track.

Here is an update of the latest committee activities:

2022 budget planning will start in June this year; this change will allow committees to develop their budget requests prior to the Session leadership transition on Aug. 1. The current timeline often results in new committee chairs developing budget requests as soon as they start on a committee.

Associate Treasurer Denice Spicer and TT&T member Pam Abreu are conducting the annual review of our 2020 Finances. Richard Lindeborg has performed this review in years past and was happy to be relieved of that responsibility this year, although he continues to provide support.

Denice and Pam are also evaluating the possibility of using Church Windows to handle our payroll. We are currently using ADP payroll services.

Pre-COVID many different groups used our church facilities, both 1000 Douglas and the Old Town Mission Community Center. As we plan for loosening restrictions, we are exploring the logistics of renting out our commercial kitchen to community members. The kitchen is currently used twice a week by our Samaritan House meals team. Stay tuned for upcoming news about this as we move forward.

Class for Adults and Youth: Pandemic in the Old and New Testaments

NOTE: There is no class on Easter Sunday

After Easter the Sunday morning Bible-based class for adults and youth will begin discussion of books by leading Old and New Testament scholars designed to put the current pandemic in a faith perspective:

Virus as a Summons to Faith: Reflections in a Time of Loss, Grief, and Uncertainty by Walter Brueggemann.

God and the Pandemic: A Christian Reflection on the Coronavirus and its Aftermath by N.T. Wright.

Brueggemann is the William Marcellus McPheeters Professor of Old Testament Emeritus at Columbia Theological Seminary. He is a leading interpreter of the Old Testament and author of numerous books, including *An Introduction to the Old Testament: The Canon and Christian Imagination, and Reverberations of Faith: A Theological Handbook of Old Testament Themes*

As one reader comments, "Through scriptural interpretation and prayer, Dr. Brueggemann's treatment of the current situation of global pandemic and environmental destruction gives us freedom to groan in our fear and suffering, to admit to our human culpability, to strive to let go of the past in order to live more compassionately in the present, and to hope in the everlasting and creative love of God."

Wright is the Chair of New Testament and Early Christianity at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland. He is the award-winning author of 80 books, including *After You Believe, Surprised by Hope, Simply Christian, The Challenge of Jesus, and The Meaning of Jesus* (coauthored with Marcus Borg).

Wright isn't content to just provide pat answers, or to give us the answers we want to hear, according to one reader. He keeps going back to the Bible, back to Jesus, and back to our responsibilities as image-bearers of God. In an age of knee-jerk reactions, social shaming, and trying to out-shout your "opponents," such a stubborn view of the issues is not only refreshing and welcome, but necessary if we are to maintain our status as the people of God.

Brueggemann's book is available from Amazon.com in paperback for \$14.00 (with a few used copies for less), and on Kindle for \$9.99. Other online vendors, such as Alibris.com and AbeBooks.com, have a few new and used copies for competitive prices. Paper Trail may be able to order copies, and Richard Lindeborg can order a new copy from Amazon Prime (shipping free).

Wright's book will be provided free. Register with Richard Lindeborg by April 5.

2021 Birthday Offering of Presbyterian Women

The Birthday Offering of Presbyterian Women was born in 1922 when Hallie Paxson Winsborough challenged each member of the Women's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States to give a penny for each year of her life as a "birthday gift" for Miss Dowd's School for Girls in Japan. For just shy of 100 years, this offering has provided life-giving grants to mission projects throughout the world. Take a moment to consider all that has taken place since the Birthday Offering was estab-

lished! From world wars to the internet, being the hands and feet of Christ has been a constant joy for Presbyterian Women, in easy and difficult days.

The Birthday Offering has become an annual tradition. It has funded over 200 major mission projects that continue to impact people in the United States and around the world. While the projects and donation amounts have changed, PW's commitment to improving the lives of women and children has not. Support through the birthday offering means PW can continue funding mission projects like the ones selected for 2021. Give as you have been blessed, generously and as led by the Holy Spirit. Following are descriptions of the three recipients for this year.

Garden Gate Ranch. Inc., Des Moines, Iowa, \$150,000. The Birthday Offering will assist Garden Gate Ranch in their mission by providing a separate education center for programming, therapeutic services and vocational rehabilitation.

Memorial Drive Ministries, Inc., Stone Mountain, Georgia, \$77,061. The Birthday Offering grant will provide a desperately needed roof to replace one that leaks onto the gymnasium floor where sewing, karate, dance, Frisbee, badminton, basketball and other after-school activities take place. This costly but necessary fix will ensure that Memorial Drive Ministries can continue to provide a place of welcome to diverse worshipping communities and innovative community services.

Nkhoma Mission Hospital Women's Health Center/OBGYN Theatre, Nkhoma, Malawi, \$129,145. The Birthday Offering grant will provide funds to build an obstetrics and gynecology-specific operating room next to the existing prenatal and maternity wards. This new theater will help decrease delays and reduce maternal deaths caused by having to move patients a significant distance across the hospital's grounds. This theater expansion will aid in the hospital's goals of becoming more self-sustainable by expanding the surgical services that are offered and living into its vision of being a leader in quality, Christian healthcare and training in Malawi.

LOOKING FOR VIDEO VOLUNTEERS

We need a few volunteers to help make the videos that accompany the worship music each week. Each week, the video team will receive audio files from Karyl Lyne (for the hymns) and Em Krall (for the prelude and postlude). The team will then select appropriate images and clips that fit the theme of each piece and the words of the hymns. They will add titles and lyrics and then export the video to a file that will be used during Zoom worship.

OUR COLUMBARIUM

In ancient and in Christian times the dual traditions of burial and cremation were practiced. As well as our cemetery (see March newsletter), we have a niche burial within our church in the Memorial Courtyard garden. Our columbarium is a vault with recessed metal compartments of niches for the placement of earthly remains after cremation. Each metal niche is enclosed with a protective front of bronze, with an attached bronze plate with name and dates of birth and death.

We currently have four niches with cremains, and have six niches reserved. Four more are pending reservation of the total 20 niches. Our columbarium was designed as a module, with additions easily placed to keep the shape of the cross.

We would like to encourage you in your future planning to think about reserving a space in the columbarium. Niches can be reserved by advance commitment, singly

or for family groups. The purchaser receives a certificate which indicates the choice of niche. This certificate entitles a person to a bronze nameplate and assurance of perpetual care.
