Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

SIGH. That is a big sigh of relief that on Tuesday, April 20, we submitted our proposal for the Clergy Renewal Program grant, which we have been working on for the last few months. Thanks again to the dedicated task force members who poured so much time and energy into this work: Pam Abreu, D.R. Palmer, Renee Soderlund, and Denice Spicer. We won't know if we will be a grant recipient for at least four months, but even if we do not receive the grant, the work will not be wasted. With your input, we have written ideas into the grant that we can use for clergy and congregational renewal—even if they might need to be modified.

Our proposal's theme—Tracking the Word: Embodying the Spirit—proved to be a rich metaphor for a renewal that offers everyone a chance to participate in ways that make connections to the holy and that stretch our experiences. It seems that the idea of tracking is not completely unique to us; in researching articles about a Scripture text a couple of weeks ago, I ran across this comment from Anglican priest Bob Stuhlmann, writing about a Bible Study class he held in the Boston projects: It was the cockroach racing up the concrete block wall of the Project apartment that assaulted me with the pure presence of Christ. Of course I was always looking for a sign, any sign of the holy, scouring the ground for spores and scat and anything that would lead and guide me on... For me, though, it's a new and intriguing idea; how do we track the holy?

When the task force presented the ideas that fill the pages of the proposal last Sunday, we didn't have time for a lot of details. I thought you might want to know something about some of the professional coaches included as congregational workshop leaders in the proposal. Here's a bit about three of the leaders.

Professor Roger Holland is a conductor, composer, pianist, singer and Teaching Assistant Professor in Music and Religion at the University of Denver. He also directs The Spirituals Project at the Lamont School of Music. Specializing in African American Music and Theology, Prof. Holland holds both a Master of Music in Piano Performance and a Master of Divinity in Theology. He has agreed to lead a renewal workshop on music and social justice—two passions of our congregation.

Jen Friedman is an interfaith minister, hospital chaplain and Dances of Universal Peace Leader and Mentor from Longmont, CO. She has worked as a consulting minister and musician for fifteen years and is well-versed in teaching with an "open-hearted no-mistake philosophy." The Dances of Universal Peace are meditative, joyous, multi-cultural circle dances using sacred phrases from the world's spiritual traditions and beloved songs from the peace movement. Jen's workshop will teach dance as a way of embodying Spirit with movement, responding to requests we received from our congregation for more movement in worship.

Rev. Seth Finch is Pastor at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Albuquerque. Fascinated with storytelling and its connection to our stories of faith, Seth and his congregation submitted a proposal and received funding through the Clergy Renewal Program grant a few years ago. Both he and the congregation learned the art of storytelling; during his sabbatical, Seth continued studying and practicing storytelling and has now offered to share that art with us during our time of renewal.

We will let you know when we hear whether the grant proposal was successful. In the meantime, I hope that the plans have energized you as they have those of us who worked on the task force. We couldn't have done it without your ideas and support.

So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth.

In his humiliation justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth.'

The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?' Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is

water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him.
