Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

I spent some time looking at the letter I included with the Easter bulletin last year. Easter Sunday was our 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday worshipping virtually. I pointed out in that letter how different Easter would be, how different it would feel, how different we all were feeling. Of course, Easter comes and we recognize the risen Christ no matter the circumstances. But I am wondering how we are all feeling about Easter this year.

Last year, only a few weeks into the pandemic, seeing the statistics about the number of cases and the number of deaths on a steady rise, I was a bit asea. I had never experienced anything like this. I was worried about my family and about my church family. Still I knew, as I wrote in the letter, "the love of Christ is not confined to a church building or even to the physical gathering of God's people. We are God's people, together in God's spirit if not in one location."

I think we've demonstrated that togetherness over and over in the last year. We have continued to come together as a faith community. We have welcomed new faces into our worship. We have held meetings to make decisions about our church; we have studied and discussed books and ideas; we have celebrated happy occasions; and we have cried over the loss of loved ones together via Zoom. We have found ways to reach out and care for one another as we don masks and gloves and keep distanced. As we prepare for God's light to dawn, welcoming the resurrection of Easter Sunday, we also see the light at the end of the COVID tunnel. Many of us are vaccinated. Those statistics are showing fewer new cases and fewer deaths. Although there are still restrictions in place, we can imagine a time when things will look more normal. And yes; at some point, we will be able to worship together again in our sanctuary.

My last Easter letter also mused about what the future will see when it looks back on Easter 2020. The hope I expressed a year ago still stands. I wrote:

I especially hope the future will look back and see that this Easter, as we celebrated Jesus' resurrection and our new life in Christ, we also chose resurrection for ourselves and for this world God created. I hope that this will be known as a time in which we re-created ourselves as a people living priorities set by a new understanding of all we hold in common, by a new concern for God's gifts of each other and of creation, and by a new commitment to live in unity.

I still hope those things. I hope that the months of living in the reality of COVID has not numbed us to our need to escape our old "normal," but has committed us to create that new normal. I again include here the untitled poem, written by Kitty O'Meara, that I shared with you last Easter. May you ponder it anew.
