Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

Sunday is the fourth Sunday of Easter and also the first Sunday in May. Time flies, but there's no mistaking it. The buds on the trees speak to spring; I especially love the trees that bloom in purple and lavender as they wave in the northern New Mexico "breezes." What is your favorite sign of spring?

This Sunday, we'll talk about a different kind of sign and the arguments that surrounded it in the early church circumcision, the sign of belonging for the people of Israel; the sign that identified this people (well, the men anyway) as part of this particular tribe, a sign that was sacred for this people. But as the way of Jesus began to spread to the Gentile community, there was much argument over whether Gentile converts to The Way—Jesus' Way—needed to be circumcised before becoming part of the family. The question was big enough ("Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and debate with them") that the church convened a meeting in Jerusalem among Paul, Barnabas, the apostles and elders of the church. Like Philip's encounter with the Ethiopian eunuch, which we heard about last week, this "Jerusalem Council," as it's now known, tells us something about how we as church people are to operate. The lesson goes beyond a decision on one issue—in this case, circumcision—to address issues of inclusion and change.

We will also share The Lord's Supper together on Sunday, so please have with you a bite of something to eat and a bit of something to drink. As always, anything that's common to your kitchen is fine, whether that's bread and juice, fruit and tea, donut and coffee. We trust that the presence of Christ will find its way into whatever elements we eat and drink during this meal to which Christ invites us.

On another note, I ask that you keep an eye out for two things that will be coming to you via email or snail mail. One is the May newsletter, which is chock full of information this month. Another is a survey that asks you whether or not you plan to attend worship in person when we are able to again open the doors. Now that San Miguel County is in the turquoise zone, we are getting close to that time. Of course, when we do meet, we will still need to follow state guidelines by distancing ourselves in the building, wearing masks, and practicing other precautions (such as no congregational singing), but we will be able to be in the building together. At the same time, those who do not feel comfortable being indoors with others just yet and those who join us virtually from other places across the country (and sometimes beyond our borders!) will still be able to join us electronically. As frustrating as it can be, technology offers us wonderful ways to be together—to include those who for whatever reason are not physically with us.

SCRIPTURE READING Acts 15:1-18

Then certain individuals came down from Judea and were teaching the brothers, 'Unless you are circumcised according to the custom of Moses, you cannot be saved.' And after Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and debate with them, Paul and Barnabas and some of the others were appointed to go up to Jerusalem to discuss this question with the apostles and the elders. So they were sent on their way by the church, and as they passed through both Phoenicia and Samaria, they reported the conversion of the Gentiles, and brought great joy to all the believers. When they came to Jerusalem, they were welcomed by the church and the apostles and the elders, and they reported all that God had done with them. But some believers who belonged to the sect of the Pharisees stood up and said, 'It is necessary for them to be circumcised and ordered to keep the law of Moses.'

The apostles and the elders met together to consider this matter. After there had been much debate, Peter stood up and said to them, 'My brothers, you know that in the early days God made a choice among you, that I should be the one through whom the Gentiles would hear the message of the good news and become believers. And God, who knows the human heart, testified to them by giving them the Holy Spirit, just as he did to us; and in cleansing their hearts by faith he has made no distinction between them and us. Now therefore why are you putting God to the test by placing on the neck of the disciples a voke that neither our ancestors nor we have been able to bear? On the contrary, we believe that we will be saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus, just as they will.'

The whole assembly kept silence, and listened to Barnabas and Paul as they told of all the signs and wonders that God had done through them among the Gentiles. After they finished speaking, James replied, 'My brothers, listen to me. Simeon has related how God first looked favorably on the Gentiles, to take from among them a people for his name. This agrees with the words of the prophets, as it is written,

"After this I will return, and I will rebuild the dwelling of David, which has fallen;

from its ruins I will rebuild it, and I will set it up, so that all other peoples may seek the Lordeven all the Gentiles over whom my name has been called.

Thus says the Lord, who has been making these things known from long ago."
