PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

April is a time of fullness. Spring blooms all around us, filling us with the hope of new life. We walk through the heavy grief of Jesus' crucifixion yet again and we recognize the fullness of God's love for us. Easter fills us with light and with resurrection hope and with the assurance of God's steadfast love. What abundance! What promise! What renewal of life all around!

And yet this year we also know the reality of war in Ukraine—a reality that fills us with a different kind of abundance—an abundance of death, destruction and hatred that does not lead to promise and new life. Of course, war is nothing new. There have been other Easters that have come in the midst of war in some part of the world. Perhaps because many of us have friends who think of Ukraine as their ancestral homeland, this one seems closer. Perhaps because we haven't seen this kind of aggressive invasion in a long time, it seems closer and scarier. It's hard to consider the promise of Easter when confronted with the reality of war, wherever that reality might play out. It's hard to feel empowered to DO SOME-THING to alter this reality. And so how, as we celebrate Easter, do we realize God's peace?

At our last Session meeting, I shared a poem written by Benedictine nun Macrina Wiederkehr (1939-2020) that I share with you here now. Sometimes, when we feel helpless to accomplish peace on a global scale, we must instead work toward a different kind of peace. The poem, "Blessed Are the Peacemakers; You Shall Be Called Children of God" (from the Beatitudes), explores that kind of peace.

Blessed Are the Peacemakers; You Shall Be Called Children of God by Macrina Wiederkehr

Then all the violence in me cried out to the peacemakers:
But where do you get all the peace that you share?

An old woman answered: We give best what we are she said,

I have searched deeply into the mystery of myself for something that would last through all the storms of life.

I have waited in faith for a great healing to arise within me.

I prayed that when it came
I would recognize it
welcome it home
and then give it away
For we can only keep
what we give away.

And now this long awaited star has risen in my heart

Its name is peace.

I found it waiting for me deep inside on the day I stopped looking and started seeing.

And now, more than anything that needs to happen in the human heart
I long to help it see the peace that's already there.

I am the peacemaker
I make peace by showing you my star
and leading you to see
the space for God you are.



WORSHIP TIDBITS

With April, we move closer to Easter. But we can't get to Easter without going through Passion Week. We'll observe Palm Sunday on April 10—the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem (although in the gospel of John, it's a little more subdued than in the synoptic gospels) and then the walk with Jesus in those last days before the crucifixion, and finally, crucifixion and death. We continue to listen during this time of trial and grief for Jesus' voice. We will listen not only on Sunday mornings, but also on Good Friday evening (service at 5:30), at which time we'll see the sanctuary stripped of color as we experience the death of the Light of the World.

Darkness.

And then, Easter. Light. Resurrection. Mary encountering the empty tomb and then encountering Jesus. Jesus appearing to the disciples, feeding them, and speaking to them in a voice both they and we recognize. "I Know That Voice!" Amen.

CLERK'S CORNER FUPC Presbytery Commissioner Report

The Presbytery Meeting was held Feb. 19, 2022, via zoom, and was informative and inspiring. As you may know, FUPC is in the Presbytery of Santa Fe, which is the northern half of New Mexico. It is also about a quarter of the Synod of the Southwest, which includes New Mexico and Arizona.

The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Santa Fe is Stephen Rhoades, who has served for many years. The Moderator of the Presbytery has a one-year term which alternates between a Minister of Word and Sacrament and a lay person. Clara Storms, the 2022 Moderator, is a lay person.

The moderator presides over the meetings, in the same way Katie presides over our session meetings. There are 37 churches in the Presbytery of Santa Fe and each church has a commissioner elected by the congregation. There are seven staff members at the Presbytery Office in Albuquerque, just off I-25. The Presbytery meets three times a year in February, June or July, and October. As is true of our churches, the Presbytery has several committees—Worship, Mission, Education, Finance & Property, Ministry, Preparation for Ministry, Personnel, Representation and Participation (nominating), and Permanent Judicial. Each committee has specific responsibilities and reports at each meeting. Meetings always have a wonderful worship service. At the February meeting, FUPC singers recorded four Taize songs for the service.

Highlights from this meeting include:

- —The approval of a minimum compensation for pastors as of Jan. 1, 2023, of \$44,675 (up from \$43,500 in 2020)
- —The Presbytery of Santa Fe overtures the 225th General Assembly (2022) to:
 - 1. Give thanks for, pray for, and commend the congregations and organizations that have initiat ed the Guns to Gardens project as a way to responsibly dispose of unwanted firearms, turning them into garden tools rather than returning them to the gun market.
 - 2. Recommend to the churches and presbyteries of the PCUSA that they learn about the Guns to Gardens project and prayerfully consider if it is a ministry to which they are called, as part of the PCUSA witness to prevent gun violence, save lives, and provide healing for a nation traumatized by violence.
 - 3. Urge the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program to add information about the Guns to Gardens program to its website list of Gun Violence Prevention Resources and encourage the Peacemaking Program and other communications and mission entities of the PCUSA to join in commending those congregations, presbyteries and synods that participate in the Guns to Gardens movement. - —The Presbytery CONCUR with the following overtures to the 225th General Assembly (2022):
 - 1. MC-01: On Recognizing Non-Chartered Fellowships as Churches to Promote Representation and Participation on National and Regional Committees and Councils
 - 2. POL- 11: On Establishing a Task Force to Explore the Theology and Practice of Ordination to Ordered Ministry for Ruling Elders
 - 3. POL-12: On Amending G-2.0504 Regarding Parish Associates
 - 4. RGJ-09: On Directing the Office of the General Assembly to Issue Apologies and Reparations for the Racist Closure of the Memorial Presbyterian Church, Juneau, Alaska

Finally, the Presbytery of Santa Fe will hold its summer meeting at FUPC in Las Vegas on Saturday, July 16, 2022. Stay tuned for how you can help welcome the Presbytery to our church in July!

This From Readers

Grace is a word that we Christians throw around, but never really take time to examine, unpack, and explore. That's a shame though. As Philip Yancey says, "Grace changes everything..." and indeed he's right. EVERYTHING is not only changed by grace, but transformed in a complete 180-degree turn around!

Yancey's use of stories and modernized parables helps paint a picture of grace that is a game changer for the Christian community, and in our society today it couldn't be more relevant. He draws on his life and travels, on his reading, on his not-always-kind reader responses, on his many conversations with both the famous and the decidedly not, and on history recent or remote. What we SEE through his eyes is the healing grace through which God takes the world into His arms.

The books are available second hand in hardback or paperback from Amazon (for \$5-10 including shipping or on Kindle for \$7.99) or other online dealers such as Alibris and Abebooks. - If you are new to Zoom, we recommend going to the link above a few minutes before the event so that you can get the Zoom app set up ahead of time.
- If you don't have a computer but want <u>to join by phone</u>, <u>call 312-626-7699</u> and enter the meeting ID number (573-920-0081) when prompted. Please note this is a Chicago number, so if your phone plan does not have unlimited calls, you may incur long-distance charges.

We believe that, in Christ, we are family. We care for each other and our community even when we are not particularly lovable. We're there for each other when we grieve and when we celebrate.


