PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

As I write this, D.R. and I are on our way home from Rio Rancho, having attended a James Taylor concert there last night. I'm sure many of you are familiar with Taylor's music and the many tunes we listened to on the radio and cassette tapes in the '70s—"Sweet Baby James," "Carolina in My Mind," and probably his most beloved song, "Fire and Rain." We heard all these live last night (although "Fire and Rain" was saved for the first encore) as well as Taylor's great blues/rock piece "Steamroller Blues" and many others. But one song, with which I was less familiar, particularly caught my attention. I was really struck by "Secret O' Life," whose first verse is:

The secret of life is enjoying the passage of time.

Any fool can do it, there ain't nothing to it.

Nobody knows how we got to the top of the hill.

But since we're on our way down, we might as well enjoy the ride.

"The secret of life is enjoying the passage of time." As I get older, that's something I try to be more intentional about. It's also something I'm not as practiced at as I'd like to be. My to-do lists are usually long and I can find it difficult to set aside the to-dos and just enjoy. It hasn't always been that way. I remember lazy summer days when I was growing up: cloud gazing, playing with friends, listening to the transistor radio, riding my bike. I remember lazy winter days: reading books, playing games, playing with friends, listening to the radio. But I'm definitely out of practice of simply enjoying the passage of time.

Being on the road back to Las Vegas helps with that. I sit here in the passenger's seat thinking of all of you, but also enjoying the way time, sun, and miles play with the clouds, which have been magnificent the last several days. (Have you noticed?) The interplay of clouds and hills makes it seem possible to run up one of those hills and right into a cloud castle. Little puffy clouds dot the blue: a small fish following a bigger one through the sea; a large bird with outstretched wing; a baby elephant with a wrinkled trunk floating on an inflated raft. The shadows on the hills shift with the curves in the road, showing both the relative bigness of hills, clouds, and sun, but also the way my perspective, my viewpoint, can make a difference.

"The secret of life is enjoying the passage of time." We can bury ourselves in to-dos, rue that time marches on and with it, change (sometimes unwelcome change) happens. Or we can take time to sit back and see the sea turtle and polar bear in the clouds connected by a condensation trail. For now, I'm going to sit back and enjoy the passing of this time on the road and, when I get back to the more mundane to-dos, approach them from the same perspective as I'm seeing animals—both mythical and real—play in the sky. I will practice enjoying the passage of time as I create something on the page, as I cook a meal, as I plan for a class. And I'll try to work into my days some time to listen to the radio and watch the clouds.

I wish for you this secret of life—enjoying the passage of time.

A WORD ABOUT THE FIRE



With the fire now largely contained, our attention has been focused on the flash floods that have caused problems on burn scars. I've spoken with many people whose property has suffered damage—fences down, debris left by floods on burn areas and in rivers and streams. We are aware, too, of the danger posed by flash flooding and hold in our prayers the family and friends of the people who died in a flash flood west of Las Vegas recently.

But day by day, many of us are feeling more "normal" around us. Let's remember, though, that for so many, whatever will be a new normal is still far away. As we learned from the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance representatives at the presbytery meeting on July 16, it is common after a disaster—like fire and flood—for those not deeply affected to forget that others still need their support. Let's continue to be aware that there are needs out there and do what we can to meet them. It might mean continued donations or financial support, or it might mean inviting someone to have a cup of coffee or a meal with you.

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view.

The Kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction

of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work.

Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying

the Kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said.

No prayer fully expresses our faith.

No confession brings perfection.

No pastoral visit brings wholeness.

No program accomplishes the Church's mission.

No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.


We may never see the end results,

Sunday Morning Class: Out of China and Back to the Holy Land

In August the Sunday Bible-Based Class for Adults and Youth will continue its series of discussions based on the book *The Lost Sutras of Jesus: Unblocking the Ancient Wisdom of the Xian Monks* by Ray Riegert and Thomas Moore. The series is led by John Arnold.

John is a former Church of Christ minister who has devoted much of his life to comparative religious studies. The recent discovery of Persian Christianity's interaction with Buddhism and Taoism in China has been a subject of special interest to him. He is an active Taoist and practices and teaches Taoist movement arts like Tai Chi in our community.



Song of Songs: Literal or Allegorical?

The last Sunday of August, the class will begin discussion of *Song of Songs: A Biblical–Theological, Allegorical, Christological Interpretation* by James M. Hamilton Jr.

Reviewer Comments: "Second, maybe, to the book of Revelation, Song of Solomon (or Song of Songs as some



"Thoughts on how to understand Song of Solomon are usually divided between those who view it strictly as a picture of human love between a man and a woman, between Christ and the (NT) church or between Christ and His covenant people (Israel). Rarely do you see those who will try to wed these interpretations together. But that is exactly what Hamilton does.

"So how does Hamilton overcome the long history of disapproval for the allegorical interpretation? He points to none other than Scripture itself. In the preface Hamilton writes, "Gradually I came to the view that if Moses can treat the covenant between Yahweh and Israel as a marriage, and Hosea can write a prophecy in which he himself represents Yah-

weh and his wife Gomer represents Israel, Solomon could have done the same."

"Further, Hamilton points out that the Apostle Paul does the same thing in Galatians 4:21-31 and with the marriage between a man and a woman as compared to Christ and the church in Ephesians 5 (29, 31). Hamilton wants us to see all three of these lenses in harmony together rather than disharmony."

Hamilton is a professor of Biblical theology at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, KY, and has been preaching pastor or senior pastor at various churches.

He's written numerous books including *God's Glory in Salvation through Judgment*, a popular-level commentary on Revelation, and a commentary on Ezra-Nehemiah.

This book is a part of the Focus on the Bible series, a 53-book series of commentaries the publisher says "are packed with contributions by top evangelical scholars and pastors, and designed to be readable for ordinary Christians, reliable for in-depth study of the Bible, and relevant for daily Christian life.

"For each section of the Bible, the Focus on the Bible commentaries summarize the passage of scripture, including the intentions of the authors, the historical and cultural environment, and the questions and issues raised by a particular passage. But most importantly, the Focus on the Bible commentaries bring you into the heart of the Bible, by explaining Scripture in an accessible way that makes sense for daily Christian living."

The book is available in paperback for as little as \$7.39 from Amazon, \$7.43 from Alibris, and \$8.81 from AbeBooks. New copies are available from Amazon or the publisher (Christian Focus Publications) for \$14.99 (all prices plus shipping).
