PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

I have had the opportunity over the last couple of weeks to talk with many people, here in town, during my travels, and with friends who live in various places. The message that always comes through is that we are going through a disorienting time. Especially here, people tell me they are feeling disoriented and bombarded with challenges. It's beginning to sound like an old, familiar tune: COVID, fire, more COVID, the potential for floods, political division and upheaval, personal and corporate loss. I have described it as feeling as if I'm living in an alternate universe. Many things look the same, but they don't feel quite normal. We are off-kilter because, whether or not we have personal loss from any of the things going on around us, we are living within the trauma of it all.

In many ways, we can move forward through this time actively doing what we can—as volunteers, as caregivers, as active citizens in the ballot box or wherever our convictions take us. But in some ways, there is not a lot we can do. We can't wave a magic wand and fix the hurt and pain around us. But we can be there for each other. I share with you here a poem by Ann Weems, which I also shared with the Session recently. I hope you find it meaningful.

I See Your Pain by Ann Weems

I see your pain

and want to banish it

with the wave of a star,

but have no star.

I see your tears

and want to dry them

with the hem of an angel's gown,

but have no angel.

I see your heart fallen to the ground

and want to return it

wrapped in cloths woven of rainbow,

but have no rainbow.

God is the One

who has stars, and angels and rainbows,

and I am the one

God sends to sit beside you

until the stars come out

and the angels dry your tears and your heart is back in place,

The news today (6/29) is that the Hermit's Peak/Calf Canyon fire is more than 90% contained. That is very good news. But as we know, with damage from the fire comes increased risk of flooding during our rainy season. Certainly, those who were displaced by the fire will need support for some time to come.

At our upcoming Presbytery meeting on July 16, people from all over the Presbytery will have an opportunity to learn from two representatives from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance about the kinds of support they offer. FEMA has also worked with community members to establish a long-term recovery group.

At FUPC, we're welcoming the Presbytery of Santa Fe summer meeting to our doors on Saturday, July 16. This meeting will host some 80 or so commissioners from the churches across the northern part of New Mexico—the Santa Fe Presbytery. The southern part of New Mexico is the Sierra Blanca Presbytery. As the FUPC Presbytery Commissioner, I'm helping to coordinate and facilitate the meeting from 10 am to 3 pm in our building. There will be a business meeting in the morning, lunch served by our wonderful Deacons, then another meeting from 1-2 and worship from 2-3. We'll need 2-3 volunteers to greet commissioners as they arrive and register/check-in in the morning between 9 and 10:15 am. If you can help with that, please let me know.

I believe the afternoon meeting may include remarks from two PCUSA Staff, Rev. Dr. Laurie Kraus, Executive Director of PDA and Rev. Jim Kirk, PDA National Response Director. You may remember that PDA, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, is one of the three efforts our Lenten One Great Hour of Sharing Offering goes to each year. The two other efforts supported by OGHS are the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Self-Developement of People. Because of the devastation of the New Mexico wildfires, WE have become one of those disasters. We may also hear from Rev. Harry Ebert, pastor at Santa Fe First Presbyterian, who has put forth an overture to the General Assembly of PCUSA, to recognize the Guns to Gardens Project across the nation. Guns to Gardens is a program that accepts guns from donors and turns those guns into garden tools—swords into plowshares so to speak. I'm intrigued by this program and looking forward to learning more. Everyone is welcome to attend all or any part of the Presbytery meeting, so come join us. I always learn so much from what other churches are doing and you would too.

CELEBRATION OF LIFE: PATRICK CASSEDAY RUCKER



EAST WING TASK FORCE RENOVATION PLAN

The East Wing doesn't need much to make it a viable area for multiple uses. The Task Force will consider any suggestions that will make the space inviting to members and non-members who are looking for a gathering spot for meetings and other uses.

Steps have already been taken to determine best use of the space as is, including a designated nursery.

Mary Schipper, chair of the task force said, "... as a church anticipating families will join us or be here for activities like memorial services or funerals or other events, we want to make sure they feel welcome." The left rear room (see drawing) has been set aside for this purpose.

The front third of the room would serve as a lounge, with the middle area serving as a meeting space with tables and chairs. At the rear right a coffee/tea space with the refrigerator and two small cafe tables and chairs (8) would be set up.

The task force has some funding, \$1,500, from a Mustard Seed grant. Donations of new or gently used items will be needed to furnish and equip the East Wing for use. Projected date of availability of the space is after Labor Day.



NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

On average, 170 families benefit from the partnership between the Food Depot out of Santa Fe and the various Las Vegas agencies who have teamed up with this important resource. Currently, the Food Depot is working with First United Presbyterian Church. The distribution events are coordinated by Karyl Lyne.

"Our biggest recent distribution happened because of a pop-up pantry requested by Gov. Michelle Lujan -Grisham," Karyl said. "This one-time event occurred May 25 in response to the growing need for food by people displaced by fires in the area. More than 270 households were served that day."

FUPC has been working with Food Depot since January, coordinating volunteers for the monthly Mobile Food Pantry. Distribution in future will be at Rodriguez Park at the west end of Grant Street, the second Friday of the month. "We are doing it there in cooperation with the city because that parking lot is much bigger. The space accommodates many cars lining up for food, plus the semi-trucks the Food Depot brings, and the cars of the volunteers."

The Mobile Food Pantry is scheduled to be at Rodriguez Park on the second Friday of each month from 9:30 to 11 a.m. Contact Karyl Lyne for more information at 505-718-6475. Volunteers are needed to load the food from the pallets into the cars.

Volunteers should plan to be at Rodriguez Park at 9 a.m. on the second Friday of the month for training and work assignments.

A SILVER THREADS MESSAGE

The Silver Threads quilting group in Las Vegas is working on completing almost 100 quilt tops that were donated from a group in Roswell for people who lost their homes in the fires. We are working at Rio Gallinas School this summer on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Donations of material for the backings (minimum of 2 yards, cotton fabric) or batting for the center of the quilts is needed. Funds donations will be used to buy batting. Donations of material or monetary donations can be dropped off at the church office.

If you have extra time this summer and would like to help, you are welcome to join us. Volunteers are needed to press the tops, sew binding or to piece backings together, and tie the quilts. Lost Sutras of Jesus: How Early Christian Texts Came to China

Note: There will be no Sunday Bible-based class Sunday, July 3

Starting July 10, the Class will start a new series of discussions led by John Arnold. This series will be based on the book *The Lost Sutras of Jesus: Unblocking the Ancient Wisdom of the Xian Monks* by Ray Riegert and Thomas Moore.

John is a former Church of Christ minister who has devoted much of his life to comparative religious studies. The recent discovery of Persian Christianity's interaction with Buddhism and Taoism in China has been a subject of special interest to him. He is an active Taoist and practices and teaches Taoist movement arts like Tai Chi in our community.

From the Publisher: <u>The Lost Sutras of Jesus</u> is a fascinating historical journey and spiritual quest into the heart of Jesus' teachings and the essence of Eastern religion. Around A.D. 640, Christian missionaries entered China from the west and had their message translated with a Taoist and Buddhist overlay. These sutras were eventually sealed in a cave, where they remained hidden for 900 years. <u>The Lost Sutras of Jesus</u> combines the amazing story of the writing, disappearance, and rediscovery of the sutras with an exploration of their message.

From a reader: "This is a necessary reference tool for anyone interested in the effect of culture on religion. If the Church of the East, largely Nestorian originally, had continued to survive, it would have had Taoist, Confuscist, and Buddhist trappings. Already by 800, these effects were clear to anyone in the material found so far (a small remnant of the original). Quite a different church than that of Rome."

EQUAL EXCHANGE AND JUST COFFEE RETURNS IN **SEPTEMBER**



HOPE: Housing Opportunities Programs for Elders

Longtime volunteer coordinator, Rosie Lopez, said things are going better for HOPE (Housing Opportunities Programs for Elders), following reorganization with a new slate of officers and new energy. Officers include Jim Croto as president, Tito Chavez as vice president, MaryBeth Song as secretary, and Jude Romero as treasurer. At large members are Bonnie Trujillo, Katherine Espinoza, and K-Kids, Kiwanis youth under the sponsorship of Aja Currey from Rio Gallinas School.

As recipient of a Las Vegas Community Foundation Bob Mishler Impact Award, Rosie donated the \$1,000 award to HOPE and additionally raised more than \$500 with a birthday go-fund-me campaign.

Moustapha, who designed the website years ago, has reactivated the website and will have it up and running in about a week.

HOPE membership is at 45 with 12 currently active. The organization is a designated 501c3 providing transportation services for medical related needs of elders (55+) of Northeastern New Mexico to support and enhance quality of life and allow seniors to remain in their own homes longer. Collaborating with United World College, 4-H and Las Vegas youth, HOPE provides household assistance to enable elders to function independently. Refer anyone needing HOPE services to 505-398-0350.

HOPE volunteers take about one member a week to Santa Fe and sometimes one a week locally to medical appointments. UWC youth cleaned yards this spring, Mennonite youth group did some extra work at a home in Camp Luna, and we're hopeful of starting activities again at the senior centers in San Miguel County, which include San Miguel, Las Vegas, and Pecos centers.

The HOPE office at the Senior Center in Las Vegas will be re-opened and operate two half days a week. Rosie said help in achieving the organization's objectives is needed and appreciated, especially drivers.

Drivers are paid \$20 a trip to Santa Fe, which may increase to \$30 because of gas prices and depending upon funding.

Rosie plans to ask Southwest Capital Bank for another grant for travel. Many HOPE drivers do not take the gas stipend and many clients donate \$10 or \$20 when they get a trip to Santa Fe, which helps the fund replenish itself.

On behalf of HOPE, Rosie thanks FUPC members who donate in any way to the viability of the organization.

Future plans for HOPE include a volunteer appreciation day July 22 at Travelers Cafe beginning at 7:30. "We plan to give baskets to the volunteers to honor them. If you have baskets to donate or things to put in them, we take gift certificates or new items," Rosie said. The goal is to put together 25 baskets.

On Aug. 27, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., HOPE will have its annual planning meeting. All are welcome to attend and bring ideas.

In September, a fundraising dance and a silent auction is planned. More information soon.
